Dental assistants assist dentists to examine and treat patients. Their work is varied as they anticipate the needs of dentists with the many different kinds of procedures carried out in dental practices. Dental assistants prepare and maintain dental instruments and equipment and often perform clerical duties.

Dental hygienists are licensed health care professionals who most often assess and provide dental hygiene treatment to patients to promote and maintain healthy teeth and gums. They also perform complex services to treat infections and disease.

Both dental assistants and dental hygienists instruct patients in oral hygiene procedures to prevent disorders and diseases.

PERSONAL SKILLS

NEEDED

Dental assistants and hygienists require a dedication to attending to the physical and emotional needs of others.

REQUIRED

COURSES

Most dental assisting programs require academic grade 12 chemistry and biology.

High School

To prepare for a dental hygiene program, complete biology, chemistry, mathematics, and English.

Post Secondary

Dental hygienists in Nova Scotia attend university to complete one year of preparatory courses, mainly sciences, followed by a two-year diploma or degree program. Graduates of the degree program perform duties of more depth and scope of responsibility than diploma graduates, and can choose from a much broader range of options for employment in clinical or community settings.

It is recommended that graduates of a dental hygiene program successfully complete the national exam set by the Canadian Dental Hygienists Association (CDHA). To practise dental hygiene in Nova Scotia, graduates must meet the requirements of the provincial licensing board, the Provincial Dental Board of Nova Scotia.

People of diverse identities, backgrounds, and experiences find dental assisting and dental hygiene to be challenging and rewarding careers that offer a broad range of mobility options. Both men and women are employed in a range of practice settings, often enjoying job security at good rates of pay.

What is the difference between dental assistants and dental hygienists?

Dental assistants are most often trained at community colleges for a period of one year including clinical experience. Their professional responsibilities differ from dental hygienists, in scope and depth, as they always work to assist dentists.

Typically, dental hygienists treat their own patients, providing scaling, polishing, fluoride treatment, and hygiene education. They keep their own patient records and inform dentists about patient care information.
