

English Language Arts 12 is an asynchronous, self-paced course. This means you can take the course wherever you want, at any time of day, and go at your own pace.

### **Meet with Mentor**

You will be required to meet online with your mentor no fewer than 12 times, for 30 minutes each time. As follows:

- Early in each unit (after lesson 3 is recommended)
- Mid-point in each unit (after Lesson 6 is recommended)
- At the end of each unit (prior to the submission of your Portfolio and Journal)

## **Time Requirement**

You have 18 months to complete the course work.

You should expect to dedicate 100 hours to this course, plus study time. For example, if you want to complete this course in a semester, you should spend at least 5 hours per week on the course.

You will need to factor your mentor's availability into planning your timeline, as they may or may not be able to meet with you if you make a last-minute request. Remember to be respectful when arranging meetings.
