# **Meet with Mentor**

You will be required to meet online with your mentor no fewer than 12 times, for 30 minutes each time. As follows:

- Early in each unit (after lesson 4 is recommended)
- Mid-point in each unit (after Lesson 8 is recommended)
- At the end of each unit (after the Unit Review is recommended)

# **Time Requirement**

You have 18 months to complete the course work.

You should expect to dedicate 110 hours to this course, plus study time. For example, if you want to complete this course in a semester, you should spend at least 5 hours per week on the course.

You will need to factor your mentor's availability into planning your timeline, as they may or may not be able to meet with you if you make a last-minute request. Remember to be respectful when arranging meetings.
