Roots of Empathy International Symposium

May 16 and 17, 2019

Roots of Empathy held its annual International Research Symposium in Toronto. It was a major success, bringing together leading scientists and practitioners in the continuous building of an evidence-based approach to this Roots of Empathy approach and program.

The presenters were international neuroscientists and researchers who have studied the social/cognitive/emotional connection. Drawing on their expertise in neurobiology, they examined a range of topics including self-regulation, human altruism, empathy, epigenetics, efficacy of touch in promoting infant growth, and the role of sleep and emotion, just to name a few. This symposium provided opportunities to exchange knowledge on social and emotional learning, attachment, neuroscience, and neuroendocrinology of social behaviour, resulting in a powerful two days.





Professional Development Day



Each year the SchoolsPlus Professional Development Day is a knowledge mobilization opportunity to support our team of Facilitators and Community Outreach Workers. We were also joined this year by Child and Youth Care Practitioners, Attendance Support Workers and Parent Navigators. This opportunity is made possible through the contribution of partner agencies and their staff who make their time and expertise available to our team. Through knowledge exchange integrated service delivery is supported, allowing for networking about initiatives and collectively responding to the needs of Nova Scotia's students and their families.

The planning committee and participants benefited from the following presenters:

Cpl. David Lane, Human Trafficking Coordinator RCMP

He provided an intro and advanced session to help better understand the trends and community impact related to human trafficking, as well as strategies for supporting youth and families impacted by human trafficking. These sessions were extremely timely as families are seeking support through referrals for wrap around services within the SchoolsPlus model.

Families and their children are deeply harmed by exposure to human trafficking and responsiveness is critical.

The SchoolsPlus model also supports numerous programs and activities outside of curriculum time to help students to be engaged and connected in their community as a preventative approach to this challenging issue.Cpl. Lane has committed to provide ongoing training and future events are being developed.





Intergenerational Trauma: Mi'Kmaw Framework

Jacob Gale Director of Mi'kmaw Services, EECD and Semise'l Sa'n, Mi'kmaw Social (Justice) Worker, Eskasoni, led participants on a transformative journey into exploring the concept of Intergenerational Trauma. The session began by examining how Mi'kmaq people lived before contact with the outside world and then talking about what happened after there was contact. The concept of Reconciliation and how we are all Treaty People was discussed.

10% of all wrap around intensive supports offered by SchoolsPlus in 2018/19 school year were provided to students and families who identify as having indigenous ancestry.

Many more students and caregivers who identify as being Mi'kmaw participate in a wide range of programming and initiatives offered through SchoolsPlus partnerships. The participants in this session were incredibly grateful for the opportunity to engage in this culturally responsive experience and will be continuing this learning journey as our Provinical Steering Committee explores recommendations from the Truth and Reconciliation Report that most resonate with our work.



Reducing Anxiety

Peyton Harris, Psychologist, IWK Déscription: Anxiety Disorders are some of the most common mental health concerns in children and teens. Anxiety disorders and worry can create big problems for many youth, interfering with their sense of overall well-being, distracting them from their school work, and in some cases, even preventing them from coming to school altogether. Participants a chance to learn about central features of any anxiety disorder, a general framework to help structure how to understand anxiety, and evidenced based strategies to support a youth (and their team of adults) to make a real difference in the lives of youth who have anxiety problems.

This session further built upon the knowledge shared at previous professional learning days adding to the compliment of universal and focused responses that can help reduce negative impacts of mental health concerns.

SchoolsPlus staff regularly work collaboratively with school based staff and inter-departmental partners to help students and their caregivers who deal with anxiety and worry.

The Why, How & What of: Taking a Restorative Approach in Schools


SchoolsPlus Facilitators and Community Outreach workers regularly engage with young people and their families where there have been challenging experiences that sometimes result in relational harm.

Restorative Approaches have been a model used within the wrap around framework of SchoolsPlus to help navigate these situations to ensure resolutions that both scaffold the young person's development and bolster engagement within the school community.

In the Restorative Approaches(RA)s in Schools session participants had a chance to learn about the difference RA makes in school communities when we take a restorative approach when working with students, families and caregivers, staff, and community members. Group discussions and activities focused on practical applications in school settings and how we support each other in this important work. Relationships are not always easy to cultivate and maintain, however we know through evidence and cultural knowledge that they are the foundation for all learning.








Loose Parts Play

Through the universal and focused supports offered in the SchoolsPlus Model, staff have relied on the growing body of evidence that indicates play (and specifically outdoor) play is a significant component needed for optimal child and youth development.

Our partners within multiple government departments/Branches including Mental Health and Addictions, Public Health, Early Childhood Development and others indicate the importance of access to play and outdoor play across the span of child and youth development.


Jillian and Laura Beth provided a summary of research which indicates that executive function is strengthened by regular exposure to the outdoors and loose parts promotes curiosity and engaged learning, and so is particularly important for learners. They encouraged us to consider how to support school-based teams to engage youth in many non-traditional recreational activities to support school engagement and to build relational connections. Further to this, participants were also offered a model to engage parents in supporting Loose Parts play within family and community settings. A portion of this session even took place outdoors. Jillian and Laura Beth agreed on a plan to offer a full day session in the summer so that we could unpack this information further and talk about a SchoolsPlus Play Philosophy to guide our work, recognizing that some students and families face barriers to outdoor play.


