Valentine's Day

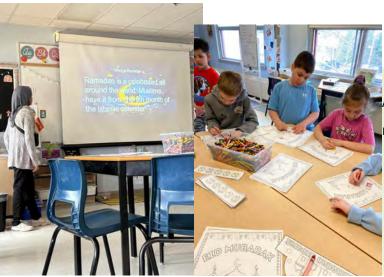

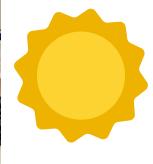


#### **Sunshine Circles**

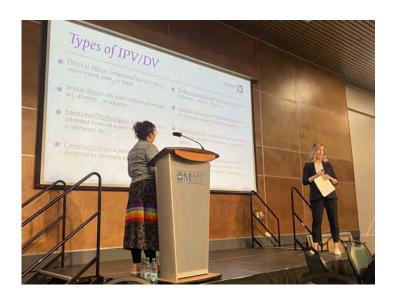
Pheonix was greeted with a tremendous amount of love and affection by SchoolsPlus staff across the province. Thank you for joining us Pheonix!

## ANNAPOLIS VALLEY REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Circle of Security

WHO: 10 caregivers in the AVRCE area

WHAT: SchoolsPlus Facilitator Emilie Smith co-facilitated the Circle of Security program to local caregivers recently, which was the first time this team had delivered the program virtually. There was great participation and engagement from all who completed the program. One of the favourite pieces of Circle of Security is when "Shark Music" is discussed. Shark Music is a term developed by the creators of Circle of Security to describe the uncomfortable or even fearful feelings, thoughts, and sensations that arise when we perceive a threat or challenge in our relationships that is actually safe. Shark Music can affect our behaviour and emotions and interfere with our ability to respond in ways that promote security in our relationships. This is typically an "aha" moment for folks in the course and always generates great discussion and reflection.

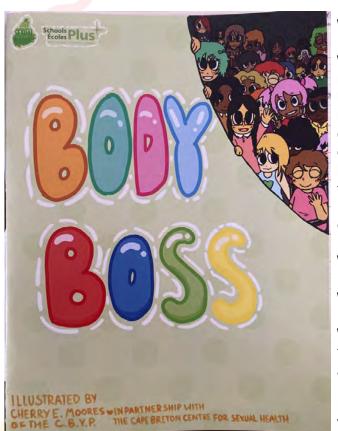

## CAPE BRETON-VICTORIA REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Body Boss





WHO: Grade 5 students

WHAT: Body Boss covers four major topics - consent and boundaries, health relationships, introduction to puberty, and internet safety - through conversations, games, art, videos, and movement exercises. Body Boss has been met with curiosity and an openness to have meaningful conversations. The students showed courage in their discussions and a willingness to create a safe learning environment for themselves and their peers - students and teachers both shared positive feedback about the program, and Body Boss will be delivered to a 3rd and 4th Grade 5 class before the end of the school year!

WHEN: Four sessions offered over several weeks

WHERE: Greenfield Elementary School

**WHY**: To talk about these age-appropriate, at times uncomfortable, topics in a safe space in order to keep students informed on safe and healthy practices

**PARTNERS**: Cape Breton Centre for Sexual Health & the Cape Breton Youth Project



## CHIGNECTO-CENTRAL REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Chef's Plus







**WHO:** Up to 25 families per week!

**WHAT**: Each week, SchoolsPlus staff would look through grocery flyers and put together a meal based on sales. Every Friday, SP staff would shop the ingredients and deliver them to participating families throughout the county. Staff filmed a weekly "how to" video to create the meals - these videos were then posted on their Facebook page for participants and followers to watch and recreate on their own. Watch for some guest stars from Trenton Middle School and the Alternative School doing some taste tests and critiques!

**WHEN**: ChefsPlus winter session ran for 5 weeks - the summer session is set to begin at the end of June, with a goal to deliver 6 weeks of fun in the kitchen!

WHERE: Pictou County

**WHY**: To offer fun, affordable suggestions for the kitchens.

## CONSEIL SCOLAIRE ACADIEN PROVINCIAL Leadership Committee

**WHO:** Students in grades 10-12 who are committed to making a positive different in their school and community

**WHAT**: The Leadership Committee meets once a week over lunch to discuss ideas for possible projects in the community. These young leaders are committed, creative, and motivated by the desire to build an inclusive, respectful, and inspiring environment.

Recently, the students collected non-perishable food, clothing, and monetary donations by going door-to-door in their communities. These items were then donated to the women of the Marguerite Centre in Timberlea, which is a long-term shelter that provides a safe, supportive, and non-judgmental environment for women recovering from addiction, violence, and other forms of trauma. The Centre provides women not only with shelter, but also with resources and programs designed to foster recovery, autonomy, and reintegration into

**WHY**: To foster community involvement, organize awareness campaign, fundraisers, charity events, & volunteer activities.



## HALIFAX REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Gender Creative Kids



WHO: Children age 5-11 from across HRCE

**WHAT**: Gender Creative Kids is a program that supports gender creatives and/or 2SLGBTQIA+ children and their parents/caregivers. During each session, snacks are provided, activity stations are set up for the kids (favourites include colouring, bracelets, and button making), staff offer a guided craft activity, and

the program finishes up with story time. Staff aim to let the kids set the tone of each session, so while it is often a laid-back environment, spontaneous dance parties have been known to occur!!

WHEN: Once a month from 4:30-6pm

**WHERE**: The program is delivered out of St. Agnes Jr. High in Halifax

**WHY**: To offer a space for children and families to build community, share resources, and have fun!

**PARTNER**: This program is delivered by Cole Harbour SP staff in partnership with the Youth Project!

# STRAIT REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Teddy Bear Picnic





WHO: Students in grade Primary to grade 4

**WHAT**: Antigonish SchoolsPlus teamed up with the CYCP in their local Hub Site to host a Teddy Bear Picnic. During our picnic we played Bingo, did bear themed crafts, watched "The Teddy Bear Picnic" movie, and had bear themed snacks. Each student wrote "All About bear", telling their stuffed friend's name, where they came from, how long they've known each other, etc.

WHERE: Antigonish Education Centre

WHY: To offer a fun activity during March Break

## SOUTH SHORE REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Kids in the Know

WHO: Grade Primary, 1, and 3/4 classes

WHAT: This safety program teaches students 7 root safety strategies. The program has curriculum that follows student through their school years, with each year building on what the students learned the year before. The students practice simple ways to get attention if they need help and what to do if they are lost. Students learn about safe secrets and secrets that they need to tell a safe adult, and they learn how a safe adult behaves. The students will often take home things to work on with their parents to facilitate conversations about safety at home. Students expressed how much they enjoyed the program, and that they are practicing the skills at home and at school. Teachers have reported that the program benefitted their students and led to deeper conversations around the topics covered in the lessons.

**WHEN**: Throughout the 2024/25 school year

**WHERE**: Bridgewater Elementary School

**WHY**: To teach kids imp<mark>ortan</mark>t strategies to keep themselves and their peers

**PARTNERS**: SchoolsPlus partnered with classroom teachers to deliver this program, which was developed by the Canadian Centre for Child Protection.

## TRI-COUNTY REGIONAL CENTRE FOR EDUCATION Biz Kidz





**WHO:** 20 students from grades 4-6

**WHAT**: During this camp, participants created their own business and eventually sold their products. They created a business plan, got a real loan (with real money!), ordered supplies, created their product or service, created a logo with support from a graphic designer, and figured out their break even point. The students made commercials and posters advertising their products and sale date - a local entrepreneur even came to speak to the students about being a business owner. On the final day, the group held a Farmers Market style sale from 11am-1pm. Following the sale the students had to repay their loans and were able to keep the profits, which ranged from \$17 to \$101!

**WHEN**: 4 days from 10am-3pm during March Break

WHERE: Yarmouth Elementary School

**WHY**: For participants to develop an skills on how to run a business and manage money

**PARTNERS**: Delivered in partnership with Nova Scotia Works. A local business also provided a donation to cover the free lunches and snacks that were provided (Health Promoting Schools in partnership with Restorative Justice)
