

As of December 2016, 214 of 378 schools in Nova Scotia have SchoolsPlus sites.







THE DRHS BASKETBALL FUNDRAISER



On October 28, 2016, Digby Regional High School hosted a basketball fundraiser to raise awareness about mental health and mental illness. The men's and women's basketball teams from Acadia and MSVU faced off to a sold-out crowd of over 240 spectators from across the province.

THE CHIT CHAT ROOM

The fundraiser idea was pitched by Mike Bartlett, Digby Subway owner and Executive Director of the Digby/Clare Mental Health Volunteers. Support from community businesses, the school community, and local professionals was overwhelming. Community members in the mental health field displayed important information regarding mental health supports in the community and highlighted where to seek help.

The Chit Chat group was heavily involved at the event. Group members greeted guests, assisted with half time challenges and provided support when needed. During the games, the MC read facts about mental illness with the purpose of delivering mental health information.

The event was a great success. Proceeds went to the Digby SchoolsPlus mental health funds, with the goal of supporting ongoing mental health activities for students in the Digby area. \$3000.00 total was raised from the event.


CCRSB SchoolsPlus and the NSHA partnered to offer a Headstrong Summit on November 17th. 120 youth from all high schools in the county participated.


CBVRSB SchoolsPlus partnered with the NSHA and guidance counselors in their middle schools to coordinate a Summit on November 10th. The event included first-voice speakers, break out sessions, and a panel.

WHAT IS A YOUTH SUMMIT?

A summit brings together students from various schools, along with school staff (teachers and administrators), to learn about mental health problems and mental illnesses and stigma, and to challenge the stereotypes and misconceptions that fuel stigma.

The three key components of a summit are education, contact, and taking action.







The three themes are like layers of an iceberg. Presenting issues, things one can see, are on the tip of the iceberg. Background and environmental issues are often 'beneath the surface issues', from which presenting issues originate.
