FEATURE STORE STORE BERWICK YOUTH RUN CLUB PARTICIPATES IN THE VALLEY HARVEST MARATHON KIDS RUN

Supporting student engagement through active participation in recreation is one focus of the Kings County SchoolsPlus Regional Advisory Committee. Three years ago, Pat Gibson, the SchoolsPlus Community Outreach Worker in Annapolis, was approached about supporting a running club, from there the Berwick Youth Run Club was formed.

ABOUT THE RUN CLUB

Partnerships: SchoolsPlus and the Active Living Coordinator at Berwick's recreation department coapplied for a grant through Western Kings Active Kids/Healthy Kids. The department also provided the club with an official logo.

Mentorship model: Elementary school students are coached by junior and senior high school student volunteers. The model allows younger students to receive support while creating opportunities for teen mentors to develop leadership skills.

Family engagement: When students race, family members attend to cheer them. Families also help with transportation to practices and events.

Community engagement: Students have attended the Gala Days Parade in Berwick to increase awareness of their club's activities in the community.



BENEFITS


The Berwick Youth Run Club has helped build relationships and improved school engagement. Conversations between the runners and the volunteers have helped develop a greater sense of belonging within the school community. Both parents and students report that these are positive experiences that would have not been possible without the run club.



THE VALLEY HARVEST MARATHON KIDS RUN

On October 7, the Berwick Youth Run Club participated in the Valley Harvest Marathon Kids Run at Acadia University's track. Leading up to the event, students from Berwick School, West Kings, Pineridge, St. Mary's, and Cambridge met once a week for 10 weeks at the Berwick School playground. This location allowed students' families to supervise younger siblings during practices. Students and their families were also introduced to the community garden behind the school. The students loved receiving a healthy snack after practice, and families often took home produce!



When: October 16-December 11




Why: To provide students with an opportunity to hear from guest speakers from their community and explore important questions they have about diversity.


SUPPORTING MI'KMAQ AND OTHER INDIGENOUS LEARNERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

The SchoolsPlus Collaborative Integrated Service Delivery model has been identified as a mechanism to better support Mi'kmaw learners, their families, and communities. The approach of creating community access to schools through hub sites and relationship building with a holistic approach to student development has been welcomed as a way to connect and better understand student needs. There are many ways in which we can work better together!

JORDAN'S PRINCIPLE



Administrators of Jordan's Principle have attended SchoolsPlus Regional Advisory Committees to share information on the available resources and referral process. SchoolsPlus team members have actively assisted students and families in the referral processes helping to ensure that the right services and resources are provided.



MI'KMAW CULTURE AND EDUCATION PILOT IN ESKASONI

This initiative is a partnership to increase cultural knowledge in the area of mental wellness by SchoolsPlus staff and First Nation community professionals. An objective of the partnership is to develop a framework for a student mental wellness program that is grounded in Mi'kmaq cultural wisdom, knowledge, and process.

Headstrong Summit


In December 2017, the SchoolsPlus Coordinator and Assistant Coordinators visited Eskasoni First Nation to work with and learn about drum-making from Elders.



Outcomes

- Developed a better understanding of Mi'kmaw approach to learning
- Experienced the role of Elders within the education process of young learners
- Examined ways to create opportunities for student wellness within SchoolsPlus Hub sites

On October 30, 2017, 75 students from Digby Regional High School, St. Mary's Bay Academy, Islands Consolidated High School, and 25 community partners participated in a full-day summit to talk about mental health and ways to reduce stigma.
